

Kosovo—A Moral Obligation


Question: Which of these two reasons is more important to you: America's moral obligation in Kosovo, or its national interest in Kosovo?



Note: Asked of those who said the US has a national interest (55%) and a moral obligation (58%) in trying to help stop Serbian actions in Kosovo.





Question: Do you support or oppose the US contributing significant amounts of money and material to help rebuild refugee areas in Kosovo?


