
Profiling the Clinton Presidency

Question: Since the start of 1993 when Bill Clinton became president, in general, would you say his presidency has been a success or a failure?






Question: In the long run, do you think the accomplishments of the Clinton Administration will outweigh its failures, or will the failures outweigh the accomplishments?


Success on the Job

Question: Overall, what kind of president do you think Bill Clinton has been—a very good president, a good president, an average president, or a poor president?





Question: Do you think Bill Clinton has accomplished most of what he set out to do as president?






Question: Do you think that as president, Bill Clinton has made the United States a better place, or a worse place, or didn't he make it much different?


Question: As you'll remember, in 1992 Bill Clinton defeated George Bush in the presidential election. If that election were held over again today, would you vote for Clinton or Bush?




Clouds of Scandal


Question: Do you think history will remember President Clinton as a highly respected leader or as a President under the cloud of constant scandals?



Question: Thinking about the future, how do you think the history books of the future will record the impeachment and trial of Bill Clinton... Will this event be a headline or a footnote in the history books?






Question: Do you think history will remember President Clinton as a highly respected leader or as a President under the cloud of constant scandals?


Question: How do you think Clinton will go down in history—as an outstanding president, above average, below average, or poor?










Question: Generally speaking, do you usually consider yourself a Republican, a Democrat, an Independent, or what?


Question: How would you describe your views on most political matters? Generally, do you think of yourself as liberal, moderate, or conservative?


