THE FIRST ROMANIA POLL

Editor's Note: The impulse is clearly irresistable: As soon as a repressive regime is either overturned or significantly "liberalized," to the end that opinions can be publically expressed, the public opinion survey makes its appearance within the country in question. Romania strikingly illustrates this development. On January 11-13, just weeks after the Ceaucescu regime was overthrown and the dictator executed, Brulé Ville Associés (BVA), the French survey firm, conducted the first-ever Romania poll for Paris-Match. Eight hundred and seventeen persons were interviewed, all in the capital city, Bucharest.

Conditions are changing rapidly, and many of the poll's findings — notably, the public's confidence that democracy would now triumph in Romania — may no longer hold true. Nonetheless, the poll's snapshot of Romanian opinion early on in the revolution yields some striking views. A few examples:

QUESTION: Did December's revolution surprise you, or do you feel it had been developing for some time?

Q: Do you approve of the way the trial and execution of Nicolae and Elena Ceaucescu was carried out?
