
ANTICIPATING GERMAN REUNIFICATION


Steady support for reunification is marred slightly by security concerns of a significant minority.

Question: Would you favor or oppose the reunification of East and West Germany?





Question: Do you personally favor or oppose the formation of one nation by unification of East and West Germany?





Question: Do you have any concerns that a reunited Germany would be a threat to peace in Europe?





Question: Do you think West Germany and East Germany should be united as one nation again?






Question: If there is a reunification between East and West Germany, do you think there would or would not be a serious risk of Germany becoming a military aggressor?


If the tenuous agreement among the NATO countries shown below prevails, a unified Germany will be a NATO member and U.S. troop levels in Europe will be stable.

Would prefer to see U.S. military forces stationed in Europe...





West German respondents






