

FAMILY DEMOGRAPHICS

The past two decades have witnessed an unprecedented deterioration of the two-parent family across all groups. but it has been most striking among blacks. This erosion has coincided with sharp increases across groups in the incidence of female-headed families.

In recent decades, the number of married-couple families with any children and the number of large families have declined. Men and women have been entering first marriages later in life, and many more women have entered the paid work force.



Median age at first marriage



The link between family status and poverty is illustrated by the data below. Incomes of female-headed families lag far behind those of married-couple families, especially among blacks and Hispanics. The incidence of poverty among female-headed families is many times higher than among married-couple families, across all groups.



Families below poverty level, 1989



The deterioration of two-parent families also has implications for crime. The data below show that only 22% of young blacks and 36% of young whites incarcerated in long-term juvenile facilities grew up in a household with both of their parents.
