
# AT THE STARTING GATE: THE 1992

Heading into the 1992 elections, Bush is viewed far more positively than lesser-known Democratic hopefuls, despite the decline in his performance ratings. Caught in the crossfire: six in ten place their faith in Bush's ability over that of a Democratic president to handle foreign policy, but a slightly higher number faults him for spending too much time on it.


Question: Do you approve or disapprove of the way George Bush is handling his job as president?

Question: If George Bush runs for reelection in 1992, in general are you more likely to vote for Bush or for the Democratic Party's candidate for president?




Question: Are you generally satisfied with the candidates now running for the Democratic nomination for president, or do you wish there were more choices? (CBS/NYT)
