

30 YEARS AFTER THE SUPREME


Thirty years after the Supreme Court's landmark prayer ruling in *Engel v. Vitale*, a large majority still disapproves of the decision. Disapproval is weakest among the young, those with a college education, and those who never attend services. Polls show strong support for a constitutional amendment to allow prayer in school.




COURT'S SCHOOL PRAYER DECISION



Question: Which of these statements comes closest to your opinion?











Question: Do you think it's OK for the government to pay for chaplains for the military?

Question: Which of these statements comes closest to your opinion?






It's good for Congress to start sessions with a public prayer



It's good for sporting events at public high schools to begin with a public prayer



Question: Which of these statements comes closest to your opinion?




Question: Should a religious Christmas nativity scene be allowed on city property even if some community members say those displays are offensive to their own beliefs? What's the main reason you feel this way?

Religious Christmas nativity scene should be allowed on city property even if some community members say those displays are offensive to their beliefs



Question: Which of the following positions do you favor with respect to prayer in public schools?


