ABORTION: PRESIDENTIAL POLITICS

Voters for whom abortion was a compelling issue were much more likely to vote Republican than Democratic for president in both 1984 and 1988. Indeed, Reagan and Bush did better among voters for whom the abortion issue was important than among voters at large.


ABORTION ON ELECTION DAY (1980, 1984, 1988)

- In 1988, the Los Angeles Times exit pollsters asked voters "Which issues—if any—were most important to you in deciding how you would vote today?" (Voters could choose up to two responses, including "None," from a list of eleven.)
- In 1988, CBS News/New York Times exit pollsters asked voters "Which issues mattered most in deciding how you voted?" (Voters could choose zero to two responses from a list of nine.)
- In 1988, ABC News exit pollsters asked voters "Were any of the items...[listed on the survey bailot] very important in making your presidential choice?' "The candidates' stands on abortion" was one of 21 items listed, including "None of the above."
- In 1984, CBS News/New York Times exit pollsters asked voters "Which issues mattered most in deciding how you voted?" (Voters could choose up to two responses from a list of eight, including "None of these.")
- In 1980, CBS News/New York Times exit pollsters asked voters "Which issues were most important in deciding how you voted today?" (Voters could choose zero to two responses from a list of eight. "ERA/Abortion" was a single category.)




Would do a better job representing your opinion on abortion







If the current Supreme Court overturns Roe v. Wade, would make you...









Restrictions Americans Support

Younger women, in both parties, but particularly in the Democratic Party, are more supportive of abortion than their older counterparts. Overall, there is strong backing for some restrictions on abortion, such as parental consent and spousal notification.

Question: Please tell me whether or not you think it should be possible for a pregnant woman to obtain a legal abortion if ...?


