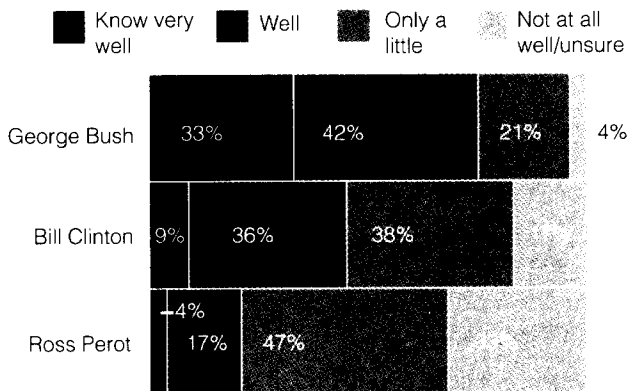


WHAT WE KNOW ABOUT PEROT

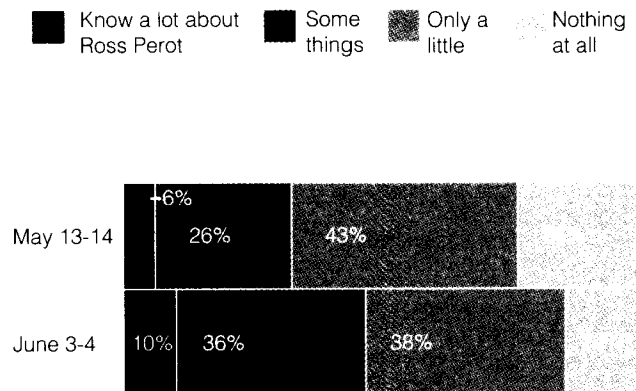
The polls consistently show that Americans still don't know much about Ross Perot. The fact that he is still a blank card makes it impossible for polls to measure his actual strength.

Question: **How well do you feel you know (name of candidate), both as a person and his stand on the issues? Would you say it is very well, well, only a little, or not at all well?**



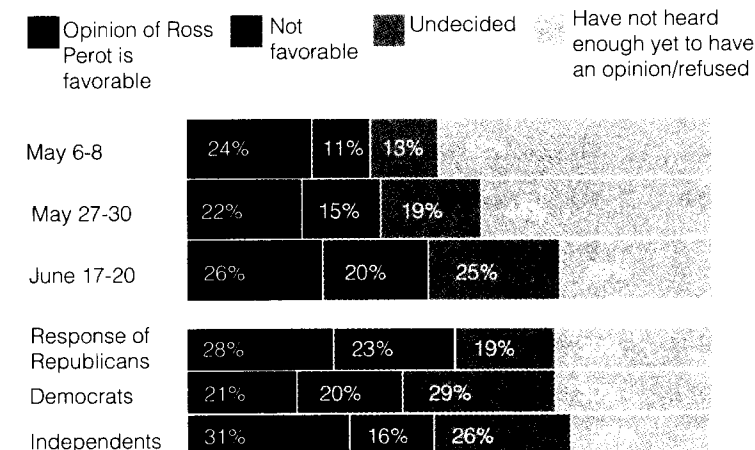
Note: Forty-one percent of Perot supporters said they knew their candidate very well or well. "Unsure" did not exceed 1% for any candidate.

Question: **How much do you know about Ross Perot—a lot, some things, only a little, or nothing at all?**



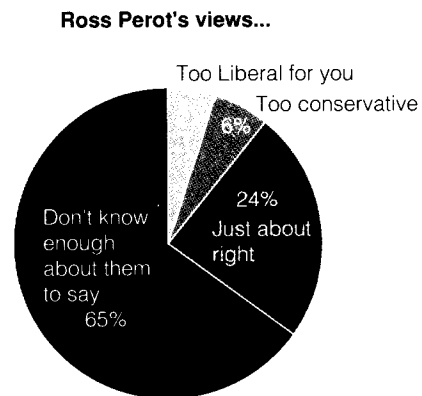
Note: Sixteen percent of Perot supporters said they knew "a lot" about him; 53% said they knew "some." "Includes "not sure" response of 1%.

Question: **Is your opinion of Ross Perot favorable, not favorable, undecided, or haven't you heard enough about Ross Perot yet to have an opinion?**

Question: **Would you say Ross Perot's views are too liberal for you, too conservative for you, just about right, or don't you know enough about his views to say?**



Note: Forty-five percent of Americans said they didn't know enough about Bill Clinton's views to say. 31% felt that way about George Bush.
