

# THE POLLS: ONE SUMMER OF VOLATILITY


**Editor's Note**: We've been hearing a lot of talk—and getting a lot of questions from journalists, students, and others—about all the bouncing around in poll trial heat numbers this past summer. We decided not to focus on the various explanations here, though, but rather to present "just the facts" of what the national polls have been showing. More of these data will be found on page 14.

We do think that the national polls have been doing a good job, and telling a fairly consistent story—one survey organization to another that is—in a very difficult polling environment. It's difficult because so many people are, in effect, cross-pressured and hadn't—in the time covered here—proceeded very far toward a final decision. One of the hardest things to measure in survey research is an opinion that really hasn't formed, or a decision not yet reached.





#### How To Read This Table and The Next Page's Data

We focus here on Bush's and Clinton's *relative strength* among the nation's social and philosophic groups. So, each candidate's backing in each group is expressed in comparison to his backing among all those interviewed in the poll. The Yankelovich Clancy Shulman survey of August 25-27 found, for example, 48% of men interviewed saying they would vote for Bush, compared to 44% of all interviewees for Bush, so the president's figure for men is +4. Similarly, 53% of women said they were for Clinton, as against 49% of the entire sample, making Clinton's standing among women +4. In the case of both surveys reported above, the percentages for each candidate include "leaners"—persons who "declared" for one or the other contender only when pushed.

The above data are from Gallup surveys for USA Today and CNN of August 21-23 and August 31-September 2, 1992. Note: As on the preceding page, if Bush or Clinton does better among a group than among all those interviewed, his "group score" is a positive number, of the magnitude shown. If less well, of course, a negative number.






#### Advantage Clinton
