

THE PRO-CHOICE LABEL

The abortion issue continues to get enormous media attention, so we continue our coverage of it. VRS, the exit polling consortium, asked primary voters in ten states whether the label "pro-choice" applied to them. Fifty-seven percent of New York Democrats said it did compared to 27% of Minnesota Republicans, for example, suggesting no national consensus about the label.




Primary voters who chose the label were slightly better educated and younger than primary voters in their respective parties. Nationally, 54% of Americans call themselves pro-choice, 34% pro-life. Solid majorities of Democrats. Republicans, and independents support the Supreme Court's Pennsylvania decision.


Question: On the issue of abortion, do you consider yourself to be prolife or pro-choice?

Question: As you may know, the Supreme Court recently decided that a woman still has the right to have an abortion until the fetus is viable but said that certain restrictions—such as a 24-hour waiting period, parental consent for girls under age 18, and requiring doctors to provide information on alternatives to abortion—are legal as long as an undue burden is not placed on a woman seeking an abortion.
