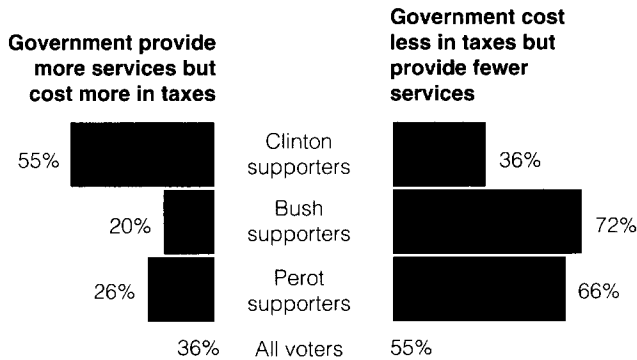


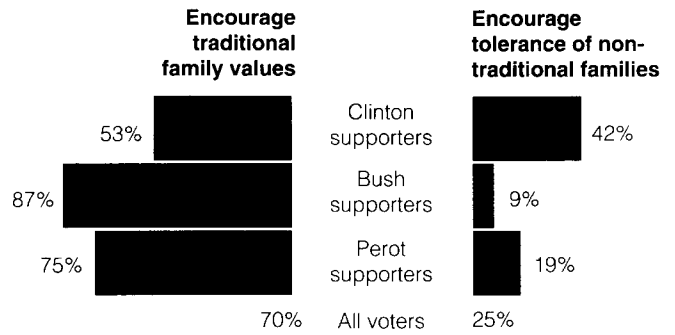
# Profiling Clinton, Bush, Perot Supporters

More Bush and Perot supporters opted for smaller government than did Clinton partisans. A third of Clinton's supporters said expanding domestic programs should be a high priority; only 15 percent of Bush and 14 percent of Perot supporters agreed. Term limits received less support from Clinton backers than from supporters of Bush or Perot.

Question: **Would you rather have...?**

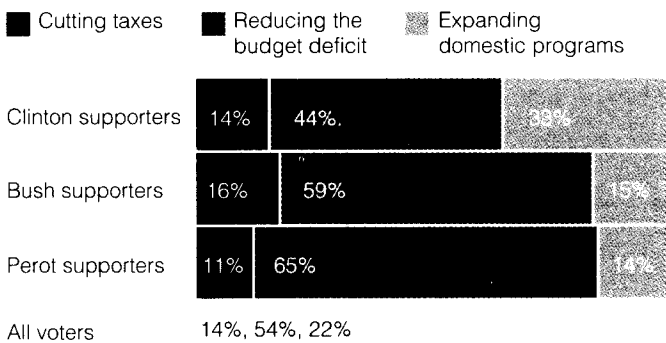


Question: **Which is more important for government to do?**

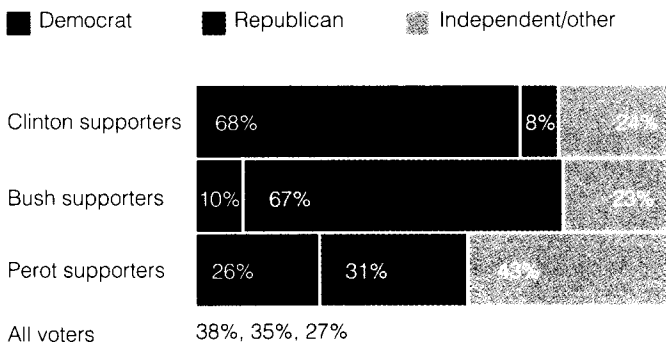

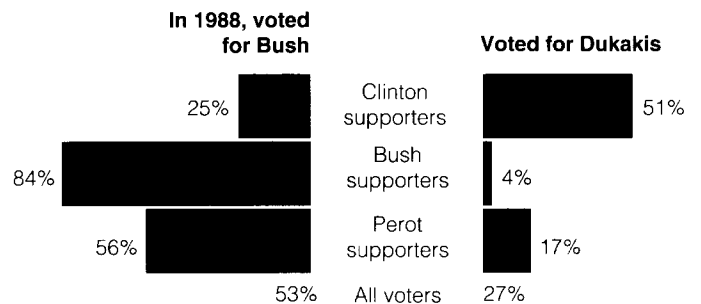

Question: **Who did you vote for in the 1988 presidential election?**

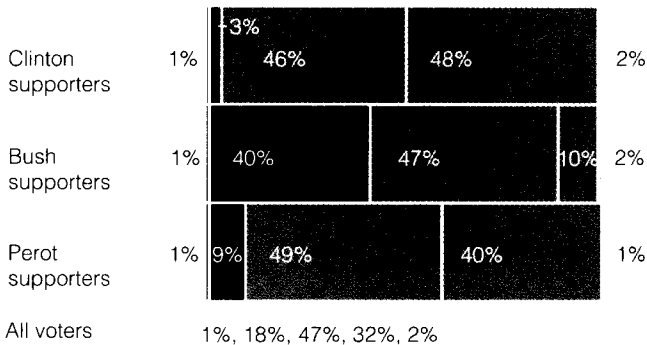

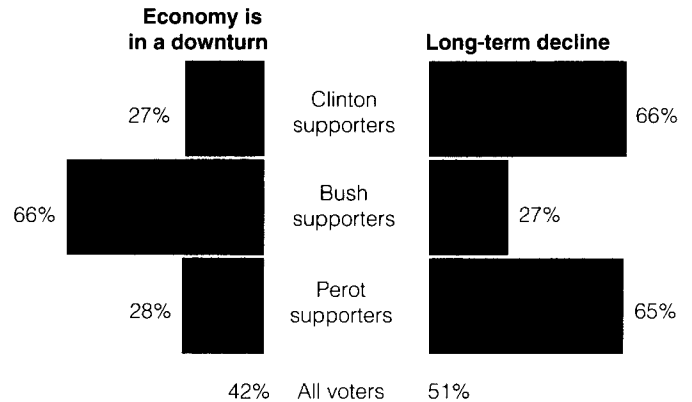

■ Excellent ■ Good ■ Not so good ■ Poor ■ No answer

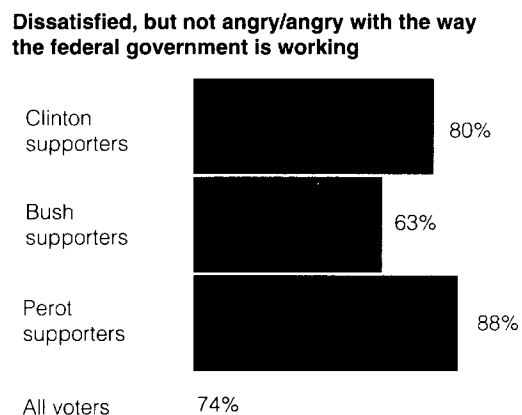
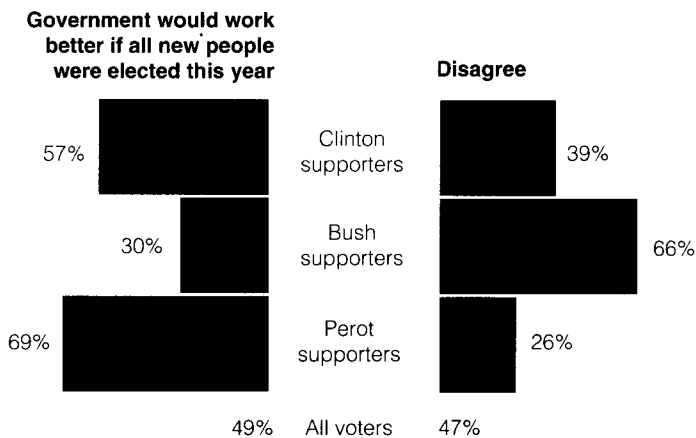


Question: **Do you think the country is in a normal economic downturn that will end before too long or a serious long-term economic decline?**



Question: **Do you agree or disagree that the...?**

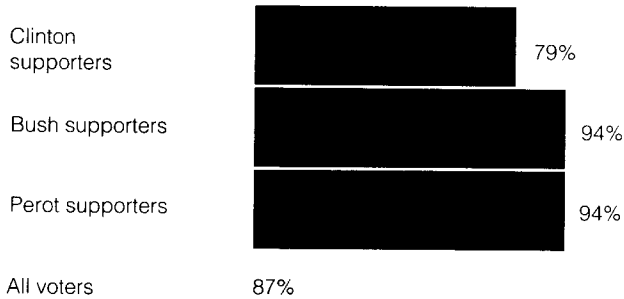

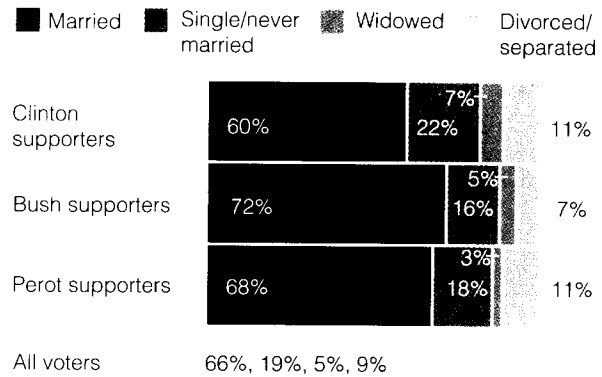

Majorities of all three candidates' supporters were married and white, though Bill Clinton's supporters were noticeably less so. There were no big surprises in income distribution statistics—Bush supporters were slightly wealthier. Bush partisans were more likely than others to say they attend religious services at least once a week.

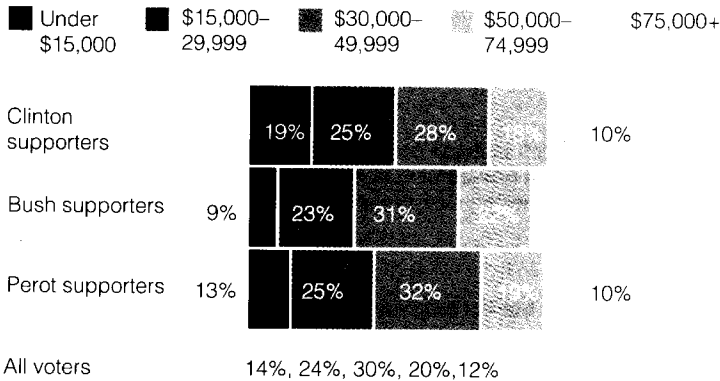
### Whites



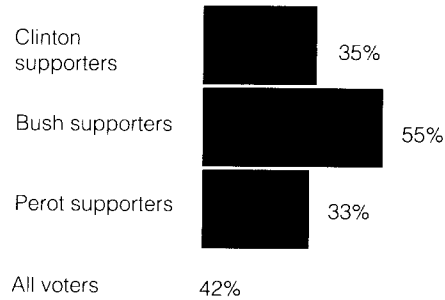
### Marital status



### Family income in 1991 was



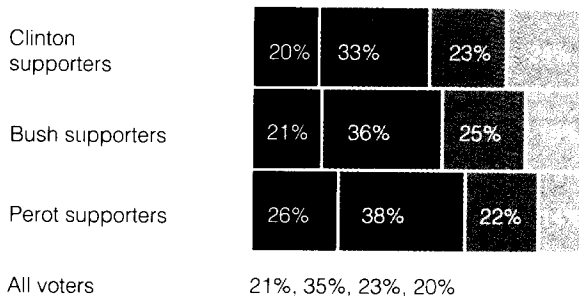
### Attend religious services at least once a week



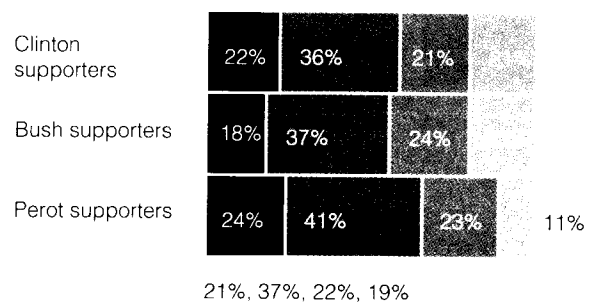
### Age and gender
