
VIEWS ABOUT HOMOSEXUALITY

Since 1973, the National Opinion Research Center has asked Americans whether homosexual relations are wrong or not. Opinions have remained stable: 70 percent said "always wrong" in 1973, 71 percent gave that response in 1991. Over the same period, premarital sex has become more acceptable.

Question: There's been a lot of discussion about the way morals and attitudes about sex are changing in this country. If a man and a woman have sex relations before marriage, do you think it is always wrong, almost always wrong, wrong only sometimes, or not wrong at all?

Question: What about sexual relations between two adults of the same sex—do you think it is always wrong, almost always wrong, wrong only sometimes, or not wrong at all?



SUBGROUP RESPONSES

The figure above shows the percentage of Americans who say that homosexual relations are always wrong. Four percent say they are almost always wrong, 5% wrong only sometimes, and 14% percent take the view that they are not wrong at all. Looking at various subgroups we find that

- * Women are less likely (69%) than men (74%) to say always wrong.
- * In 1973, 55% of 18- to 29-year olds said always wrong; today, 67% do.
- * 18- to 29-year-olds are less likely (67%) to say homosexual relations are always wrong than those 60 and over (80%), but solid majorities of both groups concur.
- * Solid majorities of Democrats (68%), independents (67%), and Republicans (79%) say always wrong.
- * Seventy-eight percent of veterans, compared to 72% of nonvets, say always wrong.
- * Attitudes correlate strongly with education. Eighty-five percent of those with less than a high school diploma say always wrong compared to only 40% of those with a postgraduate education. Women are less likely to take the always wrong position than men in each education category.
- * Combining age and education, we see that those under 45 with no college (76%) say always wrong; 86% of those over 45 with no college do.

Should not





Questions about whether the ban on homosexuals in the military should be lifted produce inconsistent responses. Opponents of lifting the ban appear to feel more strongly than those who feel it should be lifted. The Gallup data show that there are occupations for which the public believes sexual orientation should not be a factor in hiring.


The Current Controversy: Homosexuals and Military Service
