

ASSESSING GOVERNMENT

President Bill Clinton is more disposed toward federal government activism than his recent predecessors. Yet he confronts a public more skeptical about federal action than ever before. Americans' attitudes today contrast sharply with the high hopes and expectations they had for the federal government from the 1940s through the mid-1960s.

Question: Do you think there is too much power in the hands of the government in Washington?




Question: Which do you think is the most honest and efficient in performing its own special duties?




Question: Here are several statements that people critical of the government sometimes make. Just tell me whether, in general, you...?


Question: One problem is keeping any group in the United States from getting too big and too powerful. Where do you feel this problem is greatest today...? (1954)

Problem of getting too big and powerful is greatest today with...






Question: On the whole, do the activities of the national government tend to improve conditions in this country or would we be better off without them? (1960)

Question: In general, do you feel the federal government in Washington does too much for the people, or not enough for the people?







Growing Skepticism

Disaffection from federal government activity can be seen in the mid 1960s, though 39 percent disagreed in 1964 that social problems would be solved more effectively if government got out of the way. The view that the government was too expensive and inefficient was joining the familiar sentiment that it was out of touch with the people.



Question: In your opinion, which of the following do you think will be the biggest threat to the country in the future—big business, big labor, or big government?





Question: Which do you think spends the taxpayer's dollar more wisely—the state government or the federal government?



Question: As far as you and your family are concerned, do you feel you have reached the breaking point on the amount of taxes you pay, or not?





Question: In order to meet the country's needs, do you think it's necessary for taxes to be as high as they are today, or do you think they could be quite a bit lower?




The Present Critique of Government

By the early 1980s, Americans felt that the balance had tipped too much toward Washington, but the view that government should do a better job prevailed over the view that it should simply be cut. Americans are not reflexively antigovernment. They are concerned about performance, excessive costs, wastefulness, and inefficiency.


Question: All in all, would you say the present balance or responsibility between the federal government on the one hand, and the state and local governments on the other is ...?



Question: Here is a list of some groups and organizations in our society. Thinking about the role each plays in your own daily life, please tell me if you think ...?




Question: Do you think people in the government waste a lot of the money we pay in taxes, waste some of it, or don't waste very much of it?


Question: How much of the time do you think you can trust the government in Washington to do what is right-just about always, most of the time, or only some of the time?

Question: Do you think that, in general, the federal government creates more problems than it solves, or do you think it solves more problems than it creates?







Perform Better: It's Just That Simple


Criticism of the way the federal government works is higher than it has ever been. It is said to give us the least for our money and contrasts poorly with other institutions. Still, on questions about whether government should be doing more to solve the country's problems or to promote the well-being of all, significant numbers indicate support.

.5% When the government in Washington decides to solve a problem, have a lot of confidence that the problem will actually be solved


Question: From which level of government do you feel you get the least for your money?





Question: In your opinion, which is a bigger problem for this country right now—abuses by big business or abuses by the government in Washington?




Question: Do you think that people in the government waste a lot of money we pay in taxes, waste some of it, or don't waste very much of it?





Question: Would you say you favor smaller government with fewer services, or large government with many services?




