WOMEN IN COMBAT


Many surveys have asked about women in combat, but few offer guidance for the services about what positions ought to be open to women. Two general dispositions stand out: first, that men and women should have equal opportunities, and second, that we have more reservations about direct ground combat positions for women than air or naval roles.

Question: I'm going to read you some different types of direct combat assignments* in the military. For each, I'd like you to tell me whether you think that women in the military should or should not be assigned to it.

Note: Sample=2,346 enlisted men and women on active duty. The respondents were surveyed outside 38 m litary bases in the continental United States and Hawaii.




Note: "Respondents had been given this definition of direct combat: "By direct combat we mean the direct engagement of our military with a foreign enemy, operating deadly weapons with the intent to kill and the risk of being killed. Of all assignments direct combat exposes members of the military to the highest risk of injury, capture, and death." **Respondents were asked whether they think women in the military are currently assigned to listed positions.



Defense Secretary Aspin recently lifted the ban on women's participation in aerial combat in his directive to the armed forces to open up more assignments to women. Women will still be barred from direct ground combat, but women Marines can now serve in some artillery positions and the Navy has drafted a proposal for Congress which would permit women to serve on surface combat ships.
