
A New "Contract with America"? Lots of Public Unawareness

...A serious promise for which the new Republican Congress should be held responsible. ...Just a campaign promise that shouldn't be taken seriously.





Question: Do you generally favor or oppose the proposals contained in the Contract with America?*



The Direction Specified in Most of the "Contract's" Planks Finds High Public Backing


Question: Here are some proposals in the Contract with America.... For each one, please tell me whether you favor or oppose it?





The President vs. The Congress—Round 1


Question: Who do you have the most confidence in when it comes to handling the following problems—President Clinton or Republican leaders?


Clinton at Year 3—Down, Not Out

Question: Who would you like to see the Democratic Party nominate for President in 1996.... Bill Clinton or Al Gore?





Question: Please give me your best guess... If President Clinton decides to run for re-election, do you think he will win the presidential election in 1996, or do you think he will lose?








The Speaker's Outspoken—But That's Not Necessarily Bad

...Gingrich says a lot of things that need to be said, but most politicians are afraid to say.


