

How Fares the Experiment? Some Worries...

Question: Some people think that the U.S. will never again have it as good as we did in the past; others disagree. How about you? Do you think the country has already seen the best times we are going to, or not?







But the Idea Continues to Draw Strong Affirmation...


Question: A basic American belief has been that if you work hard you can get ahead—reach the goals you set and more. Does that still hold true?

Question: Earlier on in American history, many people thought the U.S. was the very best place in the world to live. Do you think it still is, or not?






Percent saying they personally believe in the Declaration's **Proclamation of Equality**


Percent saying they personally believe that hard work is in fact rewarded by success





Percent saying they believe the US is the best place in the world to live






And One's Own "Talents and Effort" are Recognized


Question: Are you more or less where you should be in your job, given your talents and effort, or has your hard work






Question: Do most Americans today have an equal chance to succeed in life or not?



Question: How about women--regardless of what they have faced in the past, do you think they have an equal chance to succeed or not?




Question: And how about black Americans-regardless of what they have faced in the past, do you think they have an equal chance to succeed


But No Doubts on the Nature of the Goal


Question: Do you think there should be a law limiting the amount of money any individual is allowed to earn





Question: Should there be a top limit on incomes so that no one can earn more than one million dollars a year?





On Equality: Still a Distinctively Individual-Centered Conception




