

Republicans Standing Up


Question: In politics, as of today, do you consider yourself a Republican, a Democrat or an Independent?

Question: Over the next two years, who do you think will have more influence over the direction of the country: President Clinton, or the Republicans in Congress?


President Clinton Republicans in Congress


National Mood Rising (a bit)
