

Quebécers and Other Canadians Look Far Apart


Question: Which of the following broad statements best describes what you think about the current state of national unity in Canada...?

Question: ...[I]f you could vote in another referendum tomorrow on the same question, how would you yourself vote ...?



Yet, In Many Ways Canada May Be Embracing Quebec







Question: Would you support or oppose recognition of Quebec as a "distinct society" based on its French language, culture and institutions?








Question: Which of the following statements comes closest to your own feelings about Canada?

percent saying "the country is in deep and serious trouble"







Question: Do you think the justice system should be tougher on lawbreakers...not as tough, or...remain as it is?


