

Question: Do you approve or disapprove of the way (President) Kennedy is handling his job as President?








Kennedy's America: Still the Democratic Era

But the 1960 Presidential Campaign Was Close From Start to Finish






Big Changes in Racial Attitudes Remind Us of the Distance From Kennedy's Time to Ours



Question: If colored people came to live next door, would you move?







Question: If black people came to live next door, would you move? Yes 1%












Question: How do you think John F. Kennedy will go down in history—as a great president, a good president, a fair president, or a poor president?














Question: Which president that you voted for do you believe will prove to have had the greatest impact on American history?










The Assassination

Question: ...Do you feel that Lee Harvey Oswald was or was not the man who shot Kennedy?




